



"Where can he be?" said Linda.




## Time for Another Adventure

"We're lost. We want to go west."


"That's dandy!" The girl shook her head. "I have to pick cotton in the middle of a war, and then I find two lost English kids in my field." She laughed and continued her work.

her field..." she added, puzzled.



"But not tonight," said Dinah, pointing to the east, where the sky was red with fire. "Tonight you're going to poor old Atlanta."


s they walked towards the town, they met many wagons of sad, frightened people travelling in the opposite direction.





Dinah smiled. "Don't you have...," she hesitated, "... slaves in England?"


"No, and after this war, slavery will end in America too," he replied.

"Yeah, for me and my family!" the man laughed sadistically and turned to the barman.


"Give me another glass of good southern whisky," he demanded.

# The American Civil War

(1861 - 1865)

n 1861 the United States of America as we know it today didn't exist. Just eighty years after the

13 eastern states had won their independence from the British Empire in the American War of Independence, the country was already internally divided between the northern and southern states. The importation of slaves had been stopped more than half a century before, in 1808, but slave labour still existed in the South and was one cause of the division.


The industrial North was richer than the agricultural South and didn't rely on slave labour. New American states, like California in 1849 after the war with Mexico, joined a Union dominated by the North.

The southern states wanted to be independent from the North. In the winter of 1860, a month after Lincoln became President, South Carolina was the first state to leave the Union. Georgia and 5 other states followed at the start of 1861 and soon the Confederate States of America were proclaimed in the South, with Jefferson Davis as President. The northern states were worried about this break and imposed economic sanctions against the Confederation. This made the southern states angry and in April, after an incident at Fort Sumter in South Carolina, the Civil War began.



# The Native Americans


n the 1600s, after the European colonisation of America, the Native Americans abandoned their agricultural life and became nomadic hunters. This change was possible thanks to the presence of wild horses and their ability as riders. Now, more than ever, their lives depended on the calendar of Nature, following the migrations of the buffalo. They lived in harmony with Nature, with no concept of private property. The Indians of the plains believed that Wakan Tanka was the creator of the world, and that when they died they went to the Happy Hunting Ground. The stories and legends of the tribe were recorded in oral traditions, often by the Shaman, their spiritual leader and "Medicine Man". Political decisions were made by a tribal council of men, but equality was important and women were respected; they had a precise role, the preparation of food and clothes, while the men hunted and prepared weapons. Children were also very important and were given a name at the age of eight or nine, when they had their first "vision", usually of an animal. Their education came from their uncle, their mother's brother. Generally, a family consisted of three or four children, and tribes were divided into bands with family connections. It was a harmonious society. Until the arrival of the white man, there was no word for law in the Indian vocabulary.







## 美国内战(1861-1865)

1861年,今天意义上的美国尚不存在。东部13个州在独立战争中摆脱英国的殖民统治取得独立80年后,整个国家已分为南北两部分。奴隶进口早在半个多世纪前的1808年便被禁止,但奴隶劳动仍然在南部各州存在,这成为国家分裂的一个原因。

工业化的北方比依靠农业的南方更富有,而且不依靠奴隶劳动。新加入美国的一些州,如1849年跟墨西哥作战而夺取的加利福尼亚州,加入了由北部统治的联邦。南部各州打算独立出去。1860年冬,林肯当选总统一个月后,南卡罗来纳州第一个脱离联邦。1861年初,佐治亚州和其他五个州也独立出去。很快,美利坚联众国在南部宣布成立,由杰斐逊·戴维斯担任总统。北方各州对它们脱离联邦忧心忡忡,于是对联众国进行经济制裁。这令南方各州十分恼火。4月,南方军队向驻扎在南卡罗来纳州萨姆特堡的联邦军队发动进攻,美国内战全面爆发。

# 美国土著人

17世纪,美国变成欧洲国家的殖民地以后,美国土著人放弃他们的农业生活方式,开始游猎生活。发生这种转变的原因可能是美国土地上有许多野马,而土著人又是好骑手。然而,游猎比农业更要依赖季节的变化,特别是野牛的迁徙。他们跟大自然和睦相处,没有私人财产的概念。生活在平原上的印第安人认为,大灵是世界的创造者,他们死后会进入"快乐狩猎地"(天堂)。各部落的历史与传奇由一代代人口头相传,一般是通过巫师这位部落的精神领袖和"教士医生"进行。部落里的大事由男人参加的部落会议来决定。不过,部落内部重视平等,女人也受到尊重。她们的职责很明确,就是洗衣做饭,而男人则负责打猎,制作武器。儿童也很重要。当他们在八九岁第一次产生幻象——通常是看到一种动物时,会被取一个名字。他们由舅舅来教育。一般说来,一个家庭有三四个孩子,部落分为一些组,各组间有亲戚关系。印第安部落是一个和谐的社会。白人到来前,他们的语言中尚没有"法律"这个词。
