

路易莎·梅·奥尔科特从小家境贫寒,没有得到良好的学校教育。不过,她还是成长为一位拥有坚强意志和丰富想象力的女孩。她很早就意识到父亲不切实际,不能维持妻子和四个女儿的生活。为了供养家庭,她教过书,当过佣人,最后从事写作。美国内战开始后,她志愿当了护士,在卫生条件很差的医院里染上伤寒,回家后一直没有完全康复。这些宝贵的经历都成为她日后写作的重要素材。

《小妇人》是奥尔科特在1868年出版的小说。小说的第一部在5月和7月间出版,第二部《好妻子》于同年年底出版。1869年4月,两部小说合集的面世大受欢迎,好评如潮。奥尔科特被视为美国妇女的代表,《小妇人》也成为了学生的必读小说和经典的文学作品。

这部小说没有刺激、惊险的情节,里面描述的都是最普通的日常生活。但正是书中充满的亲情、爱情和友情让我们淡淡地感动、会心地微笑……

The four girls cheered up at this thought as they sat around the fire.




Then there was a noise at the door. The girls pushed the basket of gifts for their mother back under the chair and ran into the dining room. They sat at the table, waiting for breakfast.

The Little Women grew up during the American Civil War. Most historians believe that slavery was the main reason why this war began. They note that the South insisted on protecting slavery

because it was vital to the South's economy. The North wanted

to weaken slavery because many Northerners felt that slavery was morally wrong. Before the Civil War, the South's economy was based on cotton and tobacco. Cheap labor was needed

to grow these crops. Southern plantation owners became very

wealthy by using slave labor. However, the South did not have many voting citizens. There were more people who

could vote in the North than in the South. Because of this, the

"你觉得梅格会不会对约翰感兴趣呢?"母亲问。


"谁是约翰?" 乔问。


