

查尔斯・狄更斯 (1812-1870)

Charles Dickens



查尔斯·狄更斯,英国小说家。由于出身贫寒,从小没有在学校接受过正规的教育,他 12岁便开始在工厂工作。19世纪初,资本主义 开始盛行,这为英国大城市带来了繁荣,同时 也造成了许多阴暗面:童工泛滥,工人阶级的 生活极度困苦。狄更斯亲身体验到了社会的不 公平,他开始通过自学创作小说,同时坚信只 有学习才能使他脱离贫困。狄更斯凭借自己的 亲身经历在小说中生动地描写了工人阶级大众 的日常生活以及他们的喜怒哀乐,因而他的作

品很受欢迎。狄更斯还通过诙谐的描写大胆地揭露了社会的不公正现象和社会矛盾。狄更斯最著名的作品包括《远大前程》和《雾都孤儿》等。1870年6月9日,查尔斯·狄更斯去世。他安息于威斯敏斯特教堂,与英国其他伟大的作家葬在一起。尽管人们常批评狄更斯为迎合读者的口味而过于多愁善感,但狄更斯仍与伟大的英国剧作家莎士比亚一样备受尊重,究其原因就是狄更斯创造的人物不仅被赋予了人性和幽默,同时还体现出人类真正的乐观和生命力。

《圣诞颂歌》创作于1843年,是一篇讲 述吝啬鬼斯克罗吉的圣诞故事。对于斯克罗吉这个 心胸狭窄、吝啬贪婪的老头儿来说,过圣诞节只不 过是一个荒谬可笑、让人挥金如土的阴谋。一天,斯 克罗吉已故生意伙伴雅各布·马利的鬼魂来看望了他,马 利告诉斯克罗吉在整个圣诞夜中将会有三个幽灵来找他。正如马利所 说,三个幽灵——昔日圣诞幽灵、今日圣诞幽灵和未来圣诞幽灵各来 找了斯克罗吉一次,并为他指明了过去、现在和未来他为人处事的错 误之处: 昔日圣诞幽灵带着斯克罗吉见证了他从无邪少年逐渐堕落成 一个吝啬鬼的全过程; 今日圣诞幽灵领着他看了他的雇员和外甥的快 乐生活: 而最后一位幽灵——未来圣诞幽灵则把斯克罗吉带到未来他 自己的坟墓前,他孤独的死是他贪婪、自私一生的痛苦终结。在三位 幽灵的帮助下, 斯克罗吉在圣诞节早晨醒来时大彻大悟了, 他改变了 自己的生活,变得慷慨大方,有了仁慈的好心肠。专为孩子们改编的 《圣诞颂歌》深受读者的喜爱。它告诉我们什么 才是真正快乐的生活。

Even now, seven years after Marley had died, the company was still called 'Scrooge and Marley.'


If you went to their office, that is what you would see on the door, 'Scrooge and Marley.' But now the only owner was Scrooge.







Mom prepares many kinds of food for the whole family, from salad at the beginning, to ham or turkey for the main course, and usually apple or pumpkin pie for dessert!


Of course, all this takes place after the family has exchanged gifts. Some families open their gifts on Christmas Eve, while other families wait until Christmas morning.

Soon he heard the clock strike one.


"Nothing! No one is here," he thought. "It all really was just a bad dream."

"那很好,鲍勃,"斯克罗吉说,"我还要通知你一件事情。" 这让鲍勃非常紧张。


"从今天开始,你会得到更多的钱来照顾你的家人。"斯克罗吉面带微笑地说道。


